
Slow Down and Stay Alert !

Motorists: Enter and exit driveways carefully. Please watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs. Use caution for children running out from between parked cars. Pay extra attention for children in dark clothing. Remind your teen drivers to use extra caution.

Homeowners: Do not let anyone into your home that you do not know. Check exterior lights and replace burned-out bulbs. Leave porch lights on so children will know it is alright to trick-or-treat at your home. Consider fire safety when decorating. Be suspicious of people who come to your home more than once as they may be "casing" it for burglary.

Tips for a Safe Halloween: Go only to well-lit homes and remain on porches rather than entering homes. Travel in small groups and be accompanied by an adult. Bring treats home before eating them so parents can inspect them. Use flashlights with fresh batteries or glow sticks. Cross streets at the corner and do not walk between parked cars. Watch for cars pulling out of driveways. Wear costumes that are bright, reflective, and flame retardant. Use reflective tape on costumes. Avoid masks and hats that could slide over children's eyes. Avoid wearing long, baggy, or loose costumes or oversized shoes to prevent tripping. Know the routes your children are taking if you are not going with them. Make sure you set a time that they should be home by. Stay away from animals. Even your own pet may not recognize you and become frightened.



A Quiet Turnover

Cooling temperatures prompt a gentle mixing of our waters

Most swimmers know that during summer the warmest water of lakes and ponds is near the surface. The deeper they dive, the cooler the water. The reason is that water becomes less dense as its temperature increases, so that the sun-warmed water literally floats on the top of a lake or pond. As summer progresses, a well-defined band of rapid temperature change called a thermocline forms in lakes and ponds. The band prevents the nutrient-and oxygen-rich water near the surface from mixing with the cooler, and increasingly oxygen-poor water below.

As the surface water cools in the fall, however, it becomes less dense—heavier—than the water beneath and sinks. Wind agitating the water accelerates this process, but the shortening days and cooling temperatures make the turnover relentless. Eventually the thermocline dissolves, leaving the temperature and oxygen profile of the lake fairly consistent and setting the stage for a reversal in which the coolest water is at the surface. This occurs because water is most dense at 39 degrees, which explains why lakes freeze at the top rather than the bottom.

August Garden Club Meeting:



Susan Krueger and Laura Dawson were the hostesses for the August Garden Club meeting. Susan also made a presentation on "Herbs." She had several herb recipe handouts for the members.

Following is information on "Herbs" from Powell Gardens - Home of the Heartland Harvest Garden:

- * In gardening herbs are often used as companion plants which enhance the growth of another plant and deter pests. But that's not all they are good for! They have medicinal uses, can be used as fragrances and are great in meals.
- * Herbs can add texture and aroma to your flower beds or garden, in addition to enhancing your favorite dishes in the kitchen.
- * Dried herbs are more pungent than fresh herbs, so you might need to use more if you're using them straight from the garden.
- * It's best to harvest herbs in the morning after the dew has dried, taking particular care not to bruise the leaves. When chopping herbs, cut them very finely to release more oils which carry the flavor and aroma.
- * Make sure the herbs are room temperature when you use them in cold dishes; for hot dishes consider using a bundle of sprigs.



The Heartland Harvest Garden's Top Ten Herbs are: basil, dill, lavender, lovage, mint, papalo, parsley, rosemary, sage and thyme.



Autumn Leaf Color

Why Do Leaves Change Color in the Fall? By Science Made Simple

We all enjoy the colors of autumn leaves. Did you ever wonder how and why a fall leaf changes color? Why a maple leaf turns bright red? Where do the yellows and oranges come from? To answer those questions, we first have to understand what leaves are and what they do.


Leaves are nature's food factories. Plants take water from the ground through their roots. They take a gas called carbon dioxide from the air. Plants use sunlight to turn water and carbon dioxide into glucose. Glucose is a kind of sugar. Plants use glucose as food for energy and as a building block for growing. The way plants turn water and carbon dioxide into sugar is called photosynthesis. That means "putting together with light." A chemical called chlorophyll helps make photosynthesis happen. Chlorophyll is what gives plants their green color.

As summer ends and autumn comes, the days get shorter and shorter. This is how the trees "know" to begin getting ready for winter.

During winter, there is not enough light or water for photosynthesis. The trees will rest, and live off the food they stored during the summer. They begin to shut down their food-making factories. The green chlorophyll disappears from the leaves. As the bright green fades away, we begin to see yellow and orange colors. Small amounts of these colors have been in the leaves all along. We just can't see them in the summer, because they are covered up by the green chlorophyll.

The bright reds and purples we see in leaves are made mostly in the fall. In some trees, like maples, glucose is trapped in the leaves after photosynthesis stops. Sunlight and the cool nights of autumn cause the leaves to turn this glucose into a red color. The brown color of trees like oaks is made from wastes left in the leaves.

It is the combination of all these things that make the beautiful colors we enjoy in the fall.



Energy Efficiency Tips To Make Your Home (and Your Wallet) More Comfortable

Most Americans use natural gas heat to warm their homes and families. Using energy wisely and taking the time to just check little things will make a big difference in how much you spend on your natural gas bill. Below are a few tips to help you plan how to conserve energy and save money.

Keep the Cold Out

Consumers can take easy, inexpensive steps to reduce household energy consumption and minimize energy loss. Reducing air leaks could cut as much as 10 percent from an average households' monthly energy bill. Consumers can seal leaks around doors, windows and other openings, such as pipes or duct, with caulk or weather stripping. The most common places where air escapes in homes are: floors, walls, ceilings, ducts, fireplace, plumbing penetrations, doors, windows, fans and vents, and electric outlets.

Use Energy Wisely

- Set thermostats between 65 and 70 degrees during the winter and at 58 degrees when away from the house for more than a few hours. While sleeping, add an extra blanket for warmth. Bear in mind the warmer temperatures are recommended for homes with ill or elderly persons or infants.
- Turn down thermostats automatically without sacrificing comfort by installing an automatic setback or programmable thermostat.
- Change or clean furnace filters once a month during the heating season. Furnaces consume less energy if they “breathe” more easily. Use receipt of your natural gas bill as a reminder.
- Warm air rises so use registers to direct warm air-flow across the floor.
- Close vents and doors in unused rooms and close dampers on unused fireplaces.
- Set water heater temperature at 120 degrees. A family of four, each showering for five minutes a day, uses 700 gallons of water each week. By lowering the thermostat on the water heater to 120 degrees, families can cut water heating bills without sacrificing comfort.
- Install water-flow restrictors in showerheads and faucets.
- If radiators are located near cold walls, place a sheet of aluminum foil between the radiator and the wall to reflect heat back into the room.
- Run washing machines and clothes dryers with a full load.
- On sunny days, open draperies and blinds to let the sun's warmth in. Close them at night to insulate against cold air outside.

Plan for Long-Term Energy-Efficiency Improvements

- Check to see if attic and basement have the recommended levels of insulation.
- Check the heating system and replace old, outdated appliances with high-efficiency natural gas models. When buying new appliances, compare energy ratings and annual operating costs.
- Install storm or thermal windows and doors or double-paned glass. A less expensive alternative is plastic sheeting, which can be temporarily fastened over doors and windows to prevent drafts and retain heat.

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
